Monitor Calibration

Why we need to calibrate our monitors. Every monitor is different. They come from the factory set to different default settings. In addition to that, some monitors are old, some are new and monitors age differently. CRT monitors tend to become very dark as they get older. We use different brands of monitors and those brands display color differently.

As human beings, we are very subjective in determining color. Some of us are color-blind or partially color-blind. Each individual sees colors differently. Some of us have older eyes with aging rods and cones in them. Some of us are more sensitive to bright light, or perhaps we need more light to be able to see. One person may crank up the brightness on their monitor, while another prefers it to be more subdued.

The problem. If the colors on a monitor are off to begin with and we start fooling with an image in Photoshop, then the colors are going to get even further off. The same is true for brightness. We need to find a way of standardizing a monitor so that we can then work on our photos and display them correctly. There is an organization called the ICC (International Color Consortium) that has done this for us. This organization determines what white will be. They also determine what is red and what is blue and what is green. We ideally want to get as close to this International standard as we possibly can with our individual monitors.

How a hardware calibrator works. It is a colorimeter (it measures colors). On the

back of the unit is a sensor. The sensor looks at the colors and takes a digital reading of them. The software then talks to the sensor. It looks in more detail at how the monitor responds in all areas of the color spectrum; it looks at red, green, and blue all the way from the darker ends of the spectrum to the lighter ones as well. The computer, monitor, software, and calibrator are a system designed to work together. The system puts up a certain green on the monitor and the calibration unit determines how well the monitor does in displaying that color. It then makes a monitor profile, which tells the monitor how to display the various colors.

How to use a color calibration unit. The calibrator comes with software in the box; both Macintosh and Windows versions are on the CD. You install the software. The calibration hardware unit is a USB device, so you just plug it into the USB port. You then run the software to calibrate the monitor and it leads you through every step. The procedure is very easy and takes just a few minutes. CRT monitors should be calibrated once every week or two. You can tell the software to remind you when this needs to be done. LCD monitors can be calibrated less often, since they do not drift as much. Calibrating once every month or two is enough for them.

In conclusion, it's really a valuable step in your digital workflow to begin with a calibrated monitor before you start to edit your images.

Recommended calibration units.

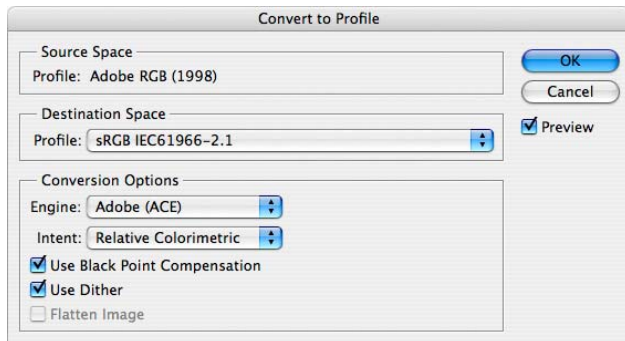

Converting to sRGB Color Profile

Digital images must be JPEG files in the sRGB color profile. In Photoshop CS2, you can make sure your image is in the sRGB color space by going to Edit>Convert to Profile. Make sure the Destination Space is set to the Profile sRGB IEC61966-2.1. Then click OK. (In some older versions of Photoshop, you do the conversion by going to Image>Mode>Convert to Profile. Make sure the Destination Space is set to the Profile sRGB IEC61966-2.1. Then click OK.

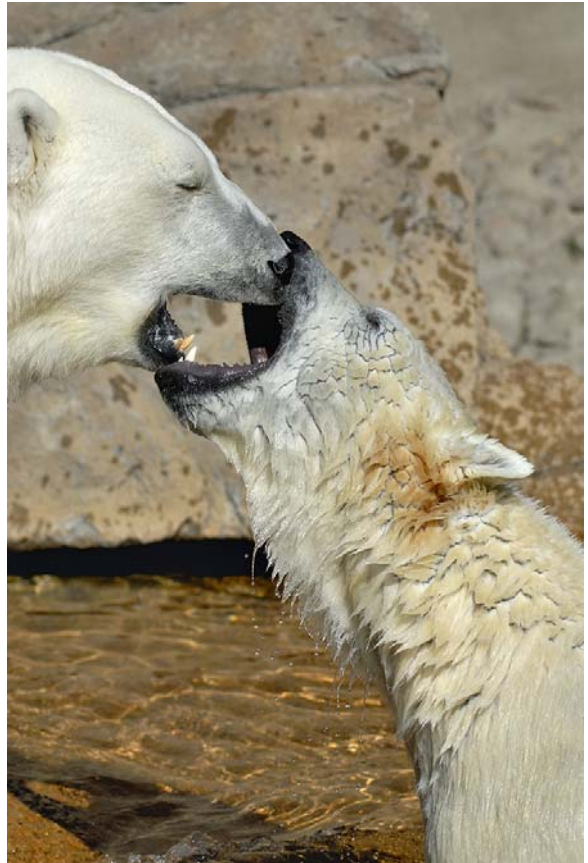
